SOMETHING TO THINK ABOUT - IT'S ALL ABOUT LOVE! BY MARY PENICH

I'm writing for you earlier than usual. The one-week ahead submission deadline usually works well for me. This time, however, I won't be home when our wonderful bulletin editor prepares this edition. My husband and I will be in Spain and Portugal with Father Joe's travel group. You'll read this the weekend we return. Hopefully, I'll have the energy to join you in checking out the rest of this week's parish news in the bulletin!

When I read today's scripture passages, a wonderful story came to mind. I was in the perfect mindset for this episode from my past because, this year, I will have missed celebrating Halloween here at home. Before we left, our grandchildren showed us their costumes and shared their trick-or-treat plans. We also arranged for a friend to hang out at our house to give candy to neighborhood trickor-treaters. Because I knew Halloween would be enjoyed by all concerned, I couldn't let go of my own Halloween spirit. That's the reason I'm sharing that spirit with you today.

I've turned back my clock to second grade. That year, my teacher decided that our class would host the best Halloween Party in the entire school. It



would also be the most saintfilled party. Sister said that the November 1st Feast of All Saints was as important as Halloween, and she decided to do something about it. Sister said that we all need good role models, and the saints are perfectly suited for

the job. With that, Sister announced her plans for a "heavenly Halloween party" with all the goodies we could convince our parents to supply. We'd also wear saintly costumes. With that, my classmates and I began assembling our costumes while begging our parents to provide lots of treats.

On Halloween, my classmates appeared as Jesus' Mother, St. Joseph, St. Francis of Assisi, several apostles and more. Sister's face glowed until my friend Eddie arrived. I couldn't believe that he'd forgotten to dress as a saint! Eddie wore a white shirt and a tie, both of which were lost under a very large suit coat. Eddie's eyes were hidden under a gray fedora which must've belonged to his dad. The frown on Sister's face told me that Eddie was in trouble –big trouble! Sister immediately took Eddie into the hall for a little talk. Though it seemed an hour to me, Sister and Eddie returned a few minutes later. Amazingly, a smile had replaced Sister's frown. Before I could check Eddie's expression, Sister announced that she had to share some very, very good news!

Sister announced that Eddie deserved an "A" in catechism. Our wide-eyed amazement must have amused Sister as she went on to explain that Eddie's

costume represented his excellent understanding of sainthood. Eddie had told Sister that his mother often called his dad a saint. His dad loved Eddie and his siblings, and he worked very hard to earn money to feed and clothe them. Tired as he was after work, Eddie's dad always helped his mom with dinner. After dinner, he asked his children how things had gone that day. He even helped with their homework. When Eddie's dad helped at bedtime, Eddie's mother often said, "Honey, you're a saint!" Good kid that he was,



Eddie listened to his mother. Though his status was still "saint-in-the-making," the saint Eddie had wisely chosen to portray was his dad.

I'm sharing this Halloween memory because Eddie's dad exhibited the intent of today's scripture passages. In Deuteronomy (6:2-6), Moses called the people to be inspired by God whose laws provide the basis for lasting relationships. God not only seeks friendship with us, but also rejoices in the lasting friendships we form with each other. In Hebrews (7:23-28), Paul insisted that Jesus remains with us when we do our best to love one another. I would add that Jesus also hangs around when we're not at our best with the hope that we will do better. Mark's gospel (Mark 12:28-34) underscores all of this with Jesus' declaration of the greatest commandments: To love God with our hearts, souls, minds and strength and to love our neighbors as we love ourselves.

You know, the rules that were most important to Jesus were those which helped his followers to



love God and to love one another most completely. Jesus asks only that we concern ourselves with the same. My second grade teacher had us dress as saints because she wanted to inspire us to be loving people. Eddie dressed like his dad because his dad filled their seemingly ordinary family life with

extraordinary love. Today, God invites you and me to do the same.

GOSPEL MEDITATION



Americans have long been fascinated with public debates. Farmers stood in muddy fields for hours to hear Lincoln and Douglas dispute each other in the 1860 presidential run-up. The televised debate between Kennedy and Nixon in 1960 fascinated the nation. These days, cable news outlets and social media parse every word spoken by candidates. We still love seeing public, rational disputes in the service of our nation.

In his day, Jesus also captured attention as a public debater. Mark tells us, "And one of the scribes came up and heard them disputing with one another, and seeing that he answered them well, asked him, 'Which commandment is the first of all?'" Jesus' brief but all-encompassing response is the double command to love God and neighbor. Notice that he includes the importance of loving God with "all your mind." Loving God is not simply a question of affection, loyalty, good deeds, and religious dedication. It demands honest and intense intellectual engagement — just like an accomplished debater.

How do we do this practically? One simple way is by embracing

ourselves as life-long learners. Setting aside time for reading, book studies, online classes, and, perhaps most difficult, engaging in open, honest, and curious conversation with those who think differently from us. These are all great ways to love God with our minds. Our country and our Church depend greatly on souls who love God in this way with their minds. Let's commit to loving God with all our minds in tireless pursuit of truth.

VENERABLE MARTHE ROBIN



Venerable Marthe Robin (1902-1981) was a French layperson and mystic whose story is truly wonderous. Born in Châteauneuf-de-Galaure (Drôme), in France to a farming family, she would spend her entire life in her family's farmhouse. Marthe met suffering early when at just 1 year old she lost her older sister to typhus and contracted the disease herself.

As an adolescent, Marthe

was struck by encephalitis, a swelling of the brain. By the age of 17, the disease paralyzed her legs. She suffered from headaches, pain in the eyes, fainting, fever, vomiting, and periods of coma. In March 1925, her arms also paralyzed, she offered a solemn prayer consecrating her life and her sufferings to God to help spread love in the world.

Marthe entered the Franciscan Third Order in 1928. Two years later the disease would paralyze her digestive track making it almost impossible for her to swallow. From this time on, she would survive on the Eucharist alone, unable to take any other nourishment. Beginning in October of 1930 she suffered an intense reliving of the Passion of Christ each Friday, bearing the stigmata, the wounds of Christ.

In 1939 her illness attacked her ocular nerve, and she was forced to live in near darkness until her death. Despite her confinement and suffering, Marthe led an intense mystical life and performed the ministries of listening, counsel, and compassion for the more than 100,000 people who visited her bedside.

With the help of Fr. Georges Finet, she founded the "Foyers of Charity", homes of light and charity run by single people, couples, and priests living in community. Today there are 60 Foyers throughout the world. Marthe was declared Venerable on November 7, 2014, by Pope Francis. Venerable Marthe Robin, pray for us!
