# **SOMETHING TO THINK ABOUT - THIS TRULY WONDERFUL LIFE!** BY MARY PENICH

This is the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord. Today, we close the Christmas Season here at church just as we have in our homes. At our house, we delayed the process until a local meteorologist promised bearable temperatures. It was then that



my husband and a younger, more daring friend tackled the outdoor lighting. I worked indoors with this year's take-down-the-tree viewing of *It's A Wonderful Life* playing in the background. Because I began my work in the living room and the television is in the family room, I raised the volume enough to allow me to hear the dialogue. This film is such a part of me that I can visualize every scene without watching a single frame. While

the guys removed light strings outdoors, George Bailey and I became reacquainted indoors.

As I boxed ornaments, I celebrated the many people to whom George's life had made all the difference in the world. I absorbed the dialogue while images of George Bailey in action flooded my memory. The selfless decisions that defined George elicited frequent tears. Though I've viewed this movie numerous times, I suffered every disappointment with George as though I had no idea that things would work out in the end. "Poor George," I thought to myself. "If only you realized just how good you are!" And so it went until the movie ended and our Christmas Tree was bare.

When I'd finally removed the last of the ornaments and light strings from our tree, it was time to commit it to the parkway. There it would lie until a public works employee tossed it into a truck for the trip to The Land of Mulch. As I considered that barren tree, it occurred to me that George Bailey often felt like that tree. You know, he could have celebrated all the wonderful things he'd done for others. He'd saved his brother from drowning and the life of a sick child who was sent the wrong medicine by a distraught pharmacist. He took over his father's business to prevent the loss of many jobs and many more homes. He used his own savings to send his brother to college in his place. All the while, George fought temptation in the form of Mr. Potter, the most miserly man in town, to stand up for the people Mr. Potter called "riffraff". To George Bailey, they were God's Riffraff! Yes, George Bailey was a good man who gave the working poor and many others something to live for.

Sadly, the day came when George felt he

had no more to give. Fortunately, the God-of-the-Riffraff was fully aware of George's discouragement. God sent Clarence, a bumbling angel-to-be, to help George. If you watch the movie, you can join George in celebrating what was truly a wonderful life. It occurs to me that celebrating our lives on this earth is the point of today's celebration of The Baptism of the Lord.

Luke's gospel (3:15-16, 21-22) tells us that John the Baptizer inspired his followers so much so that they thought he was the long-awaited messiah. John clarified the situation by explaining that someone

far greater than he was among them. When Jesus appeared to be baptized, God echoed John's prediction by announcing for all to hear, "You are my beloved Son; with you I am well pleased." The words God proclaimed over Jesus that day are meant just as readily for the George Baileys among us, for you, and for me.



Though these words don't echo from the clouds, God whispers them in the depths of our hearts. Every time we make difficult, selfless choices to help those around us, God urges us on. When we feel we have no more to give, as George Bailey did, God responds. Though God's appearance may not be as endearing as Angel Clarence, *God's presence is real!* 

Though I know the ending of *It's A Wonderful Life*, I cry through it every time. Jesus' life causes me to do the same. Jesus prayed often. He revealed God's love in his actions toward those who needed him and in stories like the Parable of the Prodigal Son. Jesus knew his life would end well, yet he suffered far more disappointment and discouragement along the way than George Bailey.



The same is true of you and me. Though our faith tells us that all will be well in the end, we worry inconsolably. When we fail to see the value of what we do, we join George Bailey in his disappointment. Much to our good fortune, it's when we're steeped in discouragement that we recall


George's joy when his life was given back to him. It is then that we recall God's words at the baptism of Jesus, and we realize those words are meant for us as well. "This is my beloved... with whom I am well pleased." Yes, even when we're ready to give up, our lives are given back to us. This fresh start signals the new beginning of our wonderful lives!

### **GOSPEL MEDITATION**



In my second year of theology studies, I went to confession to a priest visiting the seminary for a three-day retreat. My heart wasn't in it. I was going through the motions. I confessed my sins and waited for his response. The priest said, "For your penance, I'd like you to go into the chapel and repeat the words 'You are my beloved Son, with you I am well pleased' (Luke 3:22) until they mean something to you." Easy penance, I thought.

But to my surprise, I struggled to say those words. I sensed a strong interior resistance blocking them. How could God be well-pleased with me? He couldn't be, I thought. A battle within me ensued. Two hours later, the resistance vanished, and I found myself able to speak, and claim as my own, those marvelous words. I emerged from the chapel with a new, deep, peaceful conviction that I was indeed God's beloved son.

Those words are a precious gift from heaven to all of us. Jesus' baptism, which we celebrate this week, offers them to us. Are we willing to receive these words anew? Many things can block this deepening of our baptismal identity: failings, sins, disappointments, traumas, problems, and so on. Yet God's love is always greater. This week I challenge you to prayerfully repeat these words over yourself — or perhaps over someone you're struggling to love — until those words find a home in your heart.



# "Mary had a little lamb!"



Has your mother ever sung you a lullaby to help you get to sleep? It's not hard to imagine then that the Blessed Mother would have sung lullabies to Baby Jesus to help Him sleep, too!

Question: At my grandson's Baptism, the priest put a bib on the baby. I do not remember seeing this before. Why is this done? Is it something new?

**Answer:** When an adult is baptized, there is a part in the ceremony when the newly baptized is vested in a white garment. It is symbolic of the changes that baptism brings in the life of the baptized as they are freed from the bonds of sin and brought into the saving grace of Christ. Realities that are so profound are symbolically presented so that we might better grasp and understand them.

Infants are often dressed in a baptismal dress, which is the baptismal garment. In some places, the bib is used as a kind of baptismal garment. At the place in the ceremony where the investiture takes place, the bib is used. Some are poncho-like and fit over the baby's head. Others are simply placed on the baby's chest. If the baby is dressed in a white garment, nothing else is needed. The prayer says it all: "See in your white garment the outward sign of your Christian dignity ... bring that dignity unstained into the everlasting life of heaven." In baptism, we are given our purpose and goal in life as believers and this is symbolized by the white garment.



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# **ST. HILARY OF POITIERS**



Born a pagan, St. Hilary (c. 315 – c. 367) studied philosophy and the meaning of life, eventually making his way through the bible. He became a convert and was appointed bishop of Poitiers in 353. Sometimes

referred to as the Hammer of the Arians, St. Hilary defended the Nicene Creed against a popular heresy, Arianism. He was exiled to Phrygia for opposing Roman emperor Constantius II, who preferred the heresy which denies Christ's divinity. From Phyrgia St. Hilary fought with his pen, zealously writing against the heresy.

Eventually he was allowed to return to Poitiers, but did so by a circuitous route, preaching against Arianism all the way. St. Hilary was likely the first writer of hymns in the West, his writings on the Trinity, Psalms and Gospel of Matthew survive today. St. Hilary was created Doctor of the Church, a title given to those who provided important contributions to theology and doctrine, in 1851 by Pope Pius IX.
