SOMETHING TO THINK ABOUT - HIS MESSAGE STAYS WITH US -THANK GOODNESS! BY MARY PENICH

When I arrived to visit a friend in the hospital, I found her and the chaplain deep in conversation. I tip-toed away before interrupting them. My friend's room was on the hospital's eighth floor, and the views in every direction were amazing. The family lounge where I waited to see her offered a wall-length window. Since I was alone, I sat on the sill and began my own sightseeing adventure.

I found the Chicago Skyline and then quickly located the John Hancock Center, Standard Oil Building and Sears Tower in the distance. Though



these buildings' names have changed for the rest of the world, I stubbornly hold onto the designations they were given decades ago when I witnessed their construction. These

landmarks are part and parcel of my college years. 1 simply refuse to allow their new labels to distract me from precious memories of the most formative era of my life. For me, those buildings' names will always remain the same. "Funny how things stay with us," 1 mumbled to myself.

As I turned my gaze skyward, I saw billowing white clouds lingering above the hospital and that skyline. Those clouds transported me to the backyard of my childhood home where there were no buildings tall enough to obstruct my view. Many summer days, I sat on a swing with my eyes fixed on the massive white clusters above me. I loved the clouds because I knew that just beyond them God kept watch over me and my loved ones. Though my parents had never put it quite that way, their continued reliance on our benevolent Creator assured me of this reality. "Funny how things stay with us," I mumbled again.


After allowing myself to revel in these memories, I closed my eyes and turned my thoughts to heaven. Things had not been going well for my friend for a few weeks. She had to discontinue chemotherapy to undergo extensive surgery. Though her recovery from that surgery has gone quite well, the absence of chemotherapy has taken its toll. Some knew symptoms suggested a decline in her condition. After a subsequent procedure, a scan, an x-ray and more developments, the potential for the success of additional treatment seemed grim at best. At the same time, the potential for further discomfort and debilitating side effects became a certainty. When serious illnesses threatened the loved ones of my childhood, my mother ushered us into the living room every evening. There, we prayed together for our loved one's speedy recovery. After using what



remained of my wait to do the same for my friend, I mumbled once again, "Funny how things stay with us."

Not long after, the chaplain walked by on his way from my friend's room. When I went in, she shared that her conversation with the chaplain had gone well. "Someone told him that I was having a tough time. He told me a story, a good story.' With that, we discussed her uncertain future and the choices that lay ahead. Pensive as we were, we pulled out the playing cards and began a game of Gin Rummy. When another friend arrived a bit later, she joined in the game. When I finally headed home that afternoon, I considered my friend's predicament -the same that so many of our loved ones have experienced over the years. I couldn't help smiling as I acknowledged that we handled the situation just as they did. We thought. We prayed. We planned. We played. "Funny how things stay with us," I said aloud as I started my car for the drive home.

Mark's gospel (6:7-13) tells us that Jesus prepared his disciples carefully for their missions among the people. After offering them the best of his teaching and the best of his example, Jesus gave



them a few final directives: Take nothing but a walking stick... Wear sandals and a single tunic... Stay where you are welcomed... Shake off the dust of any place that doesn't welcome you... I can't help wondering what Jesus said as he watched his best friends

walk off into the distance: *Remember, I'm with you... Show them our loving God in every word and deed... Know that your best is good enough for me... I love you...* Mark closes this passage with the happy news of the disciples' surprising success. Funny how the things Jesus shared stuck with them, isn't it? Funny how the things Jesus shared stay with you and me!

GOSPEL MEDITATION



Once I asked a fallen-away Catholic friend of mine what he remembered about the parish priest from his youth. He said, "He was a gentle, nice guy. Kind of vanilla. Kept to himself." It struck me that he, perhaps like many, perceive Catholic priests as the following: lonely, harmless, and self-sufficient. As a challenge both to this perception (accurate or not) and to us priests who perhaps feel a pull in that uninspiring direction, stands the mighty image of what we see in the Gospel this Sunday.

Jesus sent out his apostles, **"two-by-two, with power over demons, and without money belts." Two-by-two:** they enjoyed deep fellowship and brotherhood. **Power over demons:** they were anything but harmless. These men wielded enormous power against evil. **Without money belts:** they were not self-sufficient. They needed others to help them. Not lonely, but in community. Not harmless but armed with massive spiritual energy. Not self-sufficient, but poor and in need of help.

This is a challenge to me, and perhaps to all of us, living in a rich, secularized, and individualized culture. Do I embrace my priestly ministry

in deep fellowship with other priests? Do I speak and act boldly to drive out evil where it is found? Do I live poorly and simply, trusting in the help of those around me even for basic needs? The fruitfulness of priestly ministry largely depends on these three traits. Let's pray for all priests — and, by extension, all of us Christians — to live more like Jesus' communal, poor, and powerful apostles.

were sealed with the promised holy Spirit, which is the first installment of our inheritance toward redemption as God's possession, to the praise of his glory.





Confession and Children

Question: Our Catholic grade school is doing a penance service this Lent. Do young children really need to go to Confession? How much sin can they really have?

Answer: Ask any mom about her children, and see how many would say she has a brood of perfect angels! Parents know that kids do things that are wrong ... and they often know they're doing it! Even toddlers have a sense of right and wrong. The Church recognizes that their minds and consciences are not yet fully developed, however, and typically waits until age seven to offer the sacrament of Confession. Around that age and beyond, most young people, when asked, can easily explain why something is wrong.

Confession for children is an excellent way to help them reflect on their actions and accept responsibility for their behavior. It helps them to grow in their understanding of sin and how it affects others. This helps them to form their consciences and make better choices in the future. Most importantly, they learn the value of forgiveness, both given and received. Rather than singling out what's wrong, Confession offers hope and a new start! Children can grow in understanding God's unconditional love and develop a sense of inner dignity that transcends their failings. Not bad for five minutes and an "Our Father" or two!

OUR LADY OF MOUNT CARMEL



The origins of this feast reach all the way back to the Old Testament. In the book of Kings, we read the story of the prophet Elijah. Much of his prayer, fasting, and public ministry occurred from Carmel, a mountain in Israel. Christian hermits -- seeking solitude -- made

their homes on the mountain during the first millennium. Over time, the hermits assembled into a community and were given a Rule of Life. They named their church after Mary --Our Lady of Mount Carmel. Political upheaval forced the Carmelite order out of the Holy Land and into Europe, where they established monasteries for both men and women across the continent. Many great saints and doctors of the Church have come from the Carmelite order, including St. Teresa of Avila, St. John of the Cross, St. Therese of Lisieux, and St. Edith Stein. Our Lady of Mount Carmel. Pray for us!
