# Sunday of Adventor

# Dear SPA Family,

What we are today and what we have is a product of our abilities and efforts, and what we have received from God and people. In what we receive from others, material values are the easiest to see. Inheriting a great fortune is something. However, it means nothing when the gift of love is lacking. It was out of love that God sent us his Son, Jesus Christ. During Advent, we wait for His coming. Being open to this gift turns the greatest sinners into saints. It is for this reason that we cannot avoid Christ, who walks with us on the pilgrimage of our lives on the pilgrimage of our lives.

John the Baptist announced the coming of Jesus,



John the Baptist announced the coming of Jesus, and in this Advent, Saint John prepares us to receive Him, this Love. He warns us and rebukes us, he calls us to straighten the paths of our lives. St. John's warning is an expression of love and concern. Only those who truly love us will tell us about our mistakes in order to save us from wasting our lives. Love makes demands so that we can be complete. In this case, he calls us to straighten the paths of our lives, because sometimes they are so twisted and bumpy that there is no chance of finding God and our neighbor on them.

I remember from my childhood, the unpaved road leading to some fields of my family farm. After the rain, it became one large puddle of mud. Traveling this road was a pain for horse wagons and especially for tractors that worked in the fields or hauled trees from the forest. More than once, my father and his sons (me too :) worked hard to get the tractor out of the muddy slush. Today, this road is leveled and paved with asphalt; my brothers can reach their destination quickly and easily. But before that happened, **a lot of work and effort had to be put into its construction.** After the road was built, the great mound near the stables from which we used to sled down in winter disappeared. Hundreds of thousands of times, the shovels dipped into this mound, taking sand to build this road.

John the Baptist calls us to straighten the paths that lead us to God and our neighbor. These are the ways of God's commandments. **Sometimes on this path, the mountains are so high and the valleys so deep that there is no chance of reaching our destinations.** Sometimes, valleys of mutual aversion are insurmountable, and mountains of prejudice reach the sky and obscure other people for us. Jealousy will twist the roads so much that we may not see the way out of them. Hate digs valleys so deep that we see nothing but revenge. And pride often reaches gigantic dimensions so that the prouds can only see themselves. All these intricacies isolate us from our neighbor and God and deprive us of the most important gift, which is love.

Lack of love stops us in development and deprives us of the possibility of a saving encounter with **God.** Straightening these paths requires a lot of effort and perseverance. However, taking this effort causes that "...all people will see God's salvation"

# **GOSPEL MEDITATION**



In the year 1995, in the seventeenth year of my life, when Fife Symington was governor of Arizona, Bill Clinton was president of the United States, Chuck Keiffer was pastor of St. Theresa parish in Phoenix, Arizona, and Ron and Mary were my parents, the word of God came to my youth minister Eric and through him I started to see the salvation of God. Soon, Christ came into my life never to leave. I'm thankful beyond words.

Why am I being so specific, you ask? Because in the Gospel this week we hear the specific names of people holding civic and religious authority in first century Palestine when "the word of God came to John the Baptist:" Tiberius Caesar, Pontius Pilate, Herod, Philip, Lysanias, Annas, Caiaphas, and Zechariah. All this is meant to help us see that God breaks into our history, into real human events. Jesus is no mere myth. He is the Word-which-breaks-in, in concrete moments, you might say. And now we anticipate his coming once again in our specific situations.

Advent challenge: Name as many civic and religious leaders who are in authority currently in your life. Now, name who the potential John

the Baptists may be. A spouse? A friend? A podcaster? A work colleague who brings God's word to you? Spend a moment considering that this comprises the concrete, historical setting into which Christ wishes to come. Then, with these specifics in mind, pray: "Come, Lord Jesus. Come."



#### Question: What is the Hispanic Advent custom of "Las Posadas"?

**Answer:** "Posada" is the Spanish word for inn or lodging. "Las Posadas" refers to a traditional Advent custom in preparation for the birth of Jesus, beginning on December 16. For nine successive evenings, groups reenact the search of Mary and Joseph for shelter in Bethlehem.

Two children dress as Mary and Joseph, sometimes with Mary riding on an actual donkey. They are usually accompanied by children dressed as angels and shepherds along with the Wise Men. Adults accompany them as they process to designated homes where they sing Christmas songs and request lodging. Part of the group enters the home and becomes the chorus that responds to the request for lodging. In the beginning the request is rebuffed. They move to several more homes where the ritual is repeated. Eventually, at the last home, their need is recognized, and they all enter the home where a party ensues. This is repeated in different neighborhoods and homes each of the nine days.

While this custom teaches children an important aspect of the Christmas story, it also emphasizes the need for hospitality to strangers and the continual need we all have to make room for Jesus in our "posada." As we struggle to arrive at a fair and just immigration policy, it would be good to recall the fact that Mary, Joseph, and Jesus were also immigrants looking for a hospitable place to dwell.





# **ST. ELIZABETH OF THE TRINITY**




St. Elizabeth of the Trinity (1880-1906) was born Elizabeth Catez in Avor, France, where her father was stationed with the military. She was the eldest of two girls. Her father died in 1887 and the widow and her daughters moved to Dijon. Their apartment was close to the city's Carmelite monastery. Elizabeth was a stubborn child with a hot temper, but she was also a good

student and an accomplished pianist.

Fascinated by the nuns at the nearby convent and inspired by Thérèse of Lisieux (also a Carmelite), Elizabeth began her religious journey. At just 14 years old she made a personal vow of virginity and set her mind on becoming a Carmelite. Elizabeth's mother opposed her desire to enter the convent and asked that she wait until she was 21. The saint worked with troubled youth and children, catechizing them while she waited.

Finally, Elizabeth was able to enter the Carmel in Dijon in 1901. She loved being a part of the community. She found particular peace and connection with the Trinity in contemplative prayer. Much of what she wrote has been published, including many of her letters and her prayer, "O My God, Trinity Whom I Adore." Elizabeth would be with the Carmelites for only five years before she succumbed to Addison's disease after much suffering. Before her death she said she was sure it would increase her joy in heaven if her friends asked for her help. She was canonized in 2016 by Pope Francis. Her fierce belief in the Trinity within us, reachable through contemplative prayer, and her deep wish that we embrace God's love by letting ourselves be loved are her powerful legacy.
